The resultant 2010 ICED "New Era Accord" accomplishes this by promoting the use of sign languages and participation by deaf citizens decision-making in all aspects of their lives.

Your weeklong anniversary celebration offers a wonderful selection of events that offer something for everyone - from historical preservation tours to activities for youth and those young at heart in addition to the President's Breakfast and Anniversary Gala. As a state association affiliate, MADC has a wealth of advocacy and cultural preservation accomplishments, thanks to its leaders, members and all who are part of its community. We take pride in this and the fact that many deaf leaders and members from Minnesota took part in shaping the NAD as we know it today. As an example, three former MADC presidents went on to become presidents of NAD during the early years. You have a very special person in Gerald "Bummy" Burnstein, who once lived in Minnesota and has story to tell about division within MADC on becoming the very first state association affiliate of the NAD.
